What is the CFA Designation/Program?

The Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) designation is a designation achievable through the successful completion of the CFA Program. The CFA Program is composed of three exams that test candidates on finance fundamentals.

The three exams combined with the necessary work requirement are meant to be completed over the course of 4 - 5 years:

- The Level I CFA exam is the first part of the exam. This can be completed during the final year of your undergraduate degree.
- The Level II CFA exam can be completed upon the successful completion of the Level I CFA exam
- The Level III CFA exam is completed following the successful completion of the Level II CFA exam

Upon passing the three exams and the completion of 4,000 hours of experience directly applicable, completed in a minimum of 36 months, you will receive your CFA designation. See also: https://www.cfainstitute.org/en/membership/apply/resources.

As of 2021, all CFA exams have shifted to a computer-based format. This has allowed additional test centers to be opened. There are currently several test centers located in Alberta, both in Calgary and Edmonton.

All costs associated with the CFA Program are paid in USD. Your first exam requires a one-time CFA Program registration fee of \$450 USD on top of the exam cost. The cost of the exam varies from \$700 to \$1,000 USD depending on the time of registration.

If you are unsuccessful after taking the exam, it is not the end of the world.

As per CFA Exam Eligibility Policy:

Candidates are permitted to take the exam a maximum of two times per calendar year (when applicable), but not in consecutive windows or windows that are six months or less apart. Candidates will have a total of six maximum attempts per exam level.
